FOREWORD

FARA continues to execute its mandate to advocate for and coordinate agricultural research on the continent to improve the development impact of research and increase investments in research and the returns therefrom by engaging with several actors across the agricultural value chain.

The overall performance in 2022 indicator of 89 per cent reflects some significant accomplishments, superior to the 76% of 2021. Significant progress was made towards making its programme financing more sustainable by shifting to a portfolio comprising a manageable number of integrated, substantial and long-term continental projects.

A compelling value proposition, a refreshed science agenda for CAADP, and a solid partnership within the CAADP-XP4 consortium all support these. One important ongoing activity is the enhancement of the collaboration and working modalities with the One CGIAR.

The Common Africa Agro-Parks (CAAPs) Programme and the Soil Initiative for Africa (SIA) are two FARA initiatives that have reached the fourth stage; the Climate Smart Agriculture (CSA) and Food Systems Mainstreaming initiatives, on the other hand, have reached the second stage. Two more initiatives are still in the planning stage. One focuses on reducing losses after harvest, while the other aims to increase the consumption and commercialization of forgotten foods.

The Board's direction to concentrate on engagements in the policy space, including at the highest level, is acknowledged by the Secretariat as valuable. The Secretariat is fulfilling its role of projecting the voice of African stakeholders by participating in COP27 to launch consultations for the African CSA action plan, participating in AUC processes to prepare for the African Fertilizer and Soil Health Summit in 2023, and engaging with the AU-EU high-level platforms for dialogue through PANAP and LEAP4FNSSA. During the Abidjan I and II dialogues between African stakeholders and the One CGIAR, stakeholders appreciated the value of this work. FARA is proving to be most beneficial through these types of activities.

FARA's Knowledge Management drive for the continent received further boost with strong collaboration with the AUC-DARBE, the One CGIAR, AFAAS and the SROs (CCARDESA, CORAF & ASARECA) especially within the three broad task areas of knowledge-hub (FARADatInformS), knowledge ecosystems strengthening (KM4AgD) and knowledge communication and advocacy. Capacities of 55 individuals representing over 40 NARES were developed with critical and active Community of Knowledge Managers, who are now working with SROs and AFAAS within the concept of subsidiarity to implement in Botswana, Namibia, Mozambique, Uganda and Ghana. Projects such as the INTREFACTES and AIRTEA have also adopted the KM4AgD model in documenting lessons and good practices.

The fragmented nature of its current programme, based on independent projects, continues to present challenges for FARA. These include the excessive expended time by staff on meeting the project management requirements of numerous individual grants, as well as the additional effort required to coordinate such projects into a coherent programme. However, as the long-term continental initiatives begin, the configuration of the programme and the challenges it poses are expected to improve.

FARA's communication strategy currently utilizes social media platforms. During the year, approximately 1,000,000 people engaged with its social media presence, resulting in an overall increase in patronage of approximately 140,000 new followers. The following are additional figures on the Knowledge Management: (a) During the year, more than one million additional stakeholders used the DataInformS portal to access information. (b) There are 3,577 registered professionals in the Expert Directory; based on the provided leads, the funding opportunities repository disseminates an average of 250 opportunities each month, with approximately 11% reporting funding successes. The posts about funding opportunities get the most attention, with an average of 20,000 clicks per month.

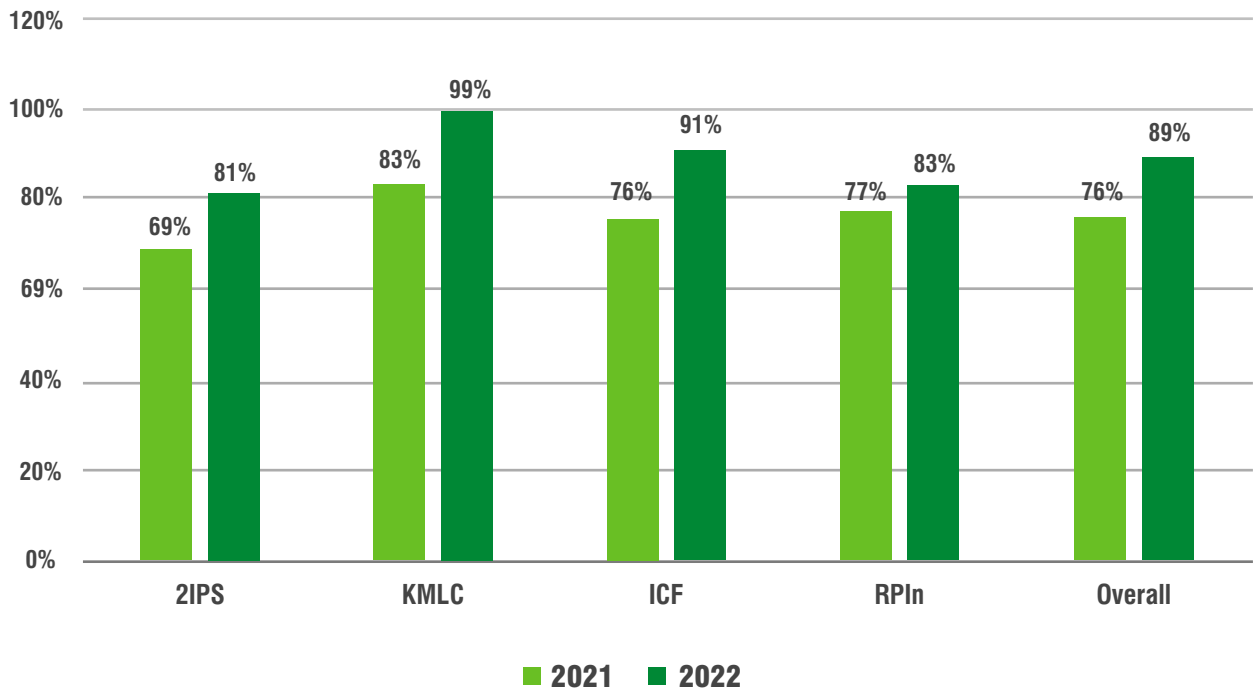

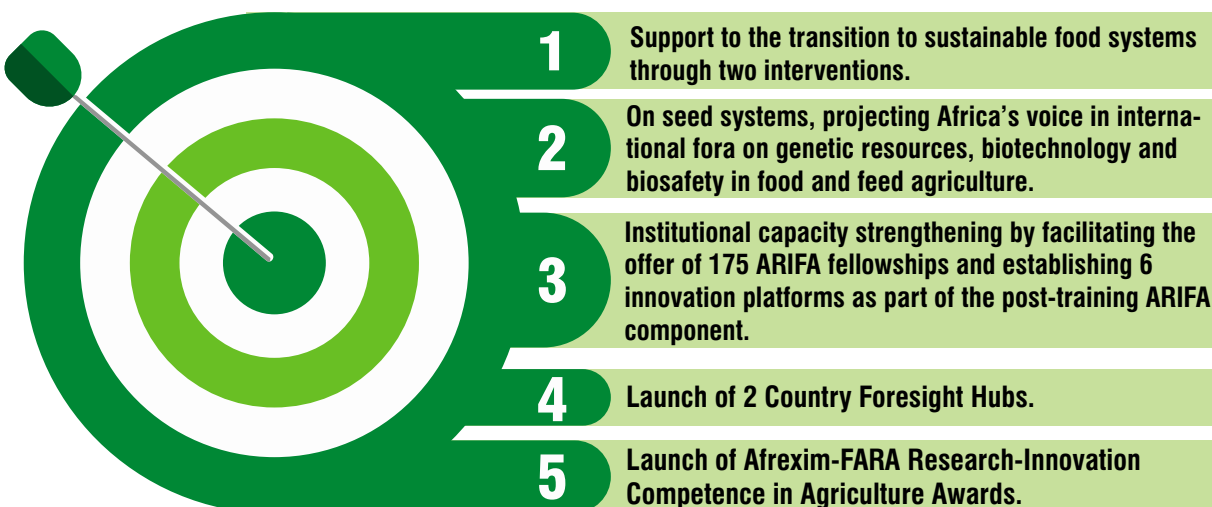

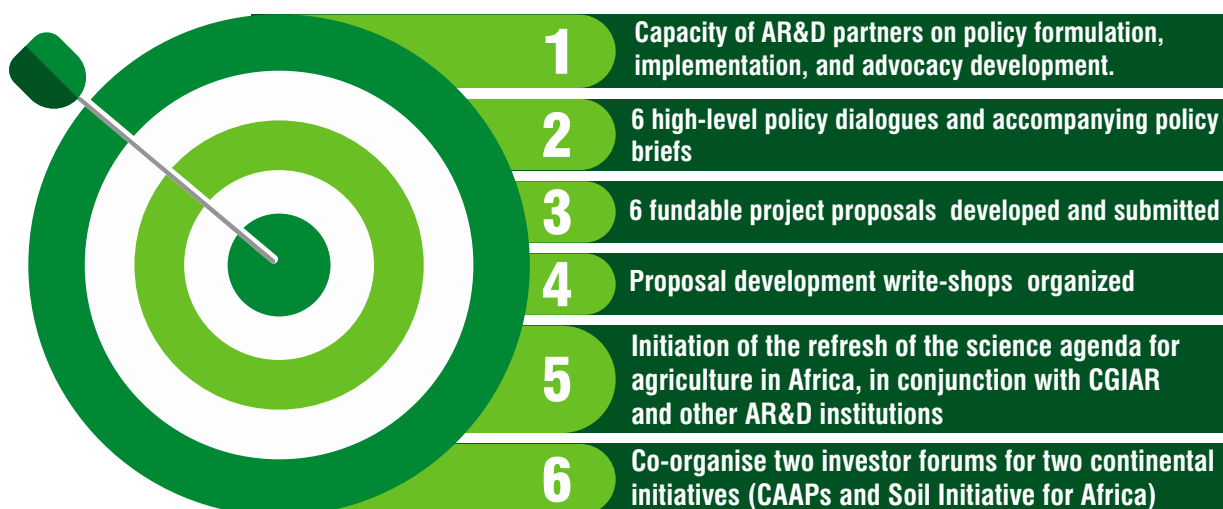

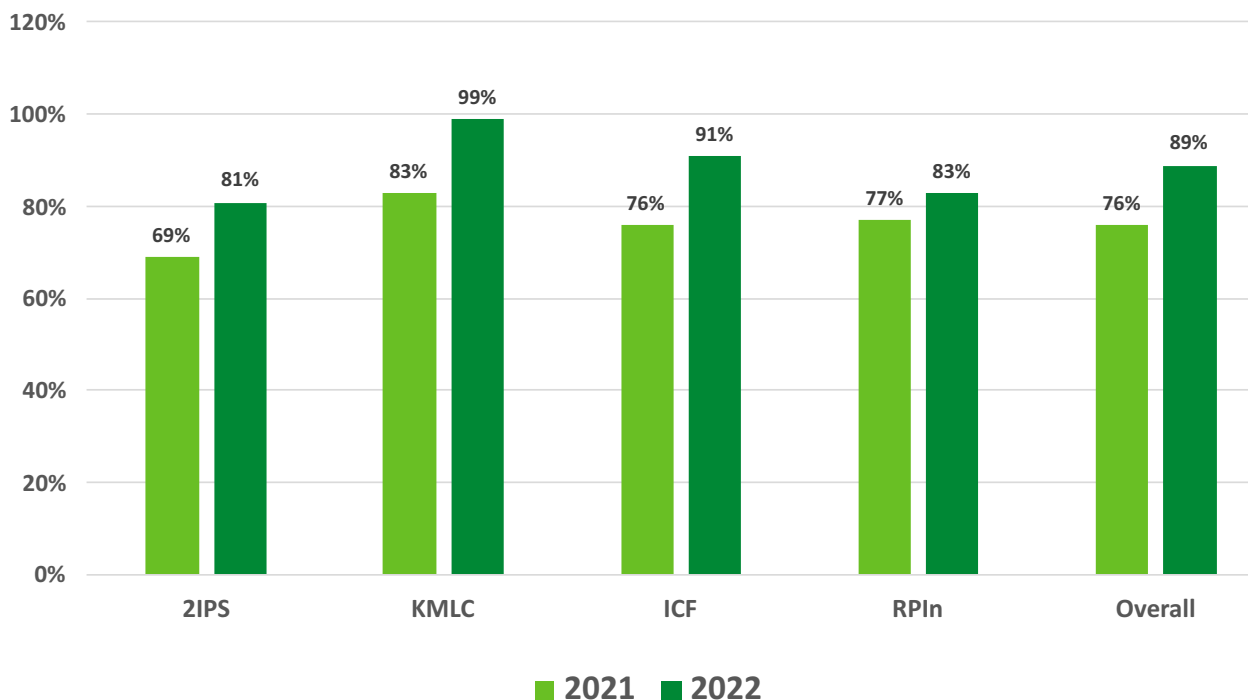

2022 Financial overview

FARA's activities during the year were mainly financed by Time Bound Activities (TBAs) through bilateral agreements with various Development Partners. The Secretariat's operations were financed mainly by recovery from projects and miscellaneous revenue.

Total revenue during the year ended 31 December 2022 amounted to USD5,900,114. Grant revenue for Programme Time Bound Activities was USD5,377,457 – see Donors' Contribution schedule below for details. Other sundry revenue amounted to USD522,657.

Total expenditure incurred during the period was USD5,891,342, of which 8.7% was for the Secretariat and 91.3% for Time Bound Activities. This resulted in a positive net balance of USD8,772.

Funds received during the year came from BMZ/ZEF for PARI activities and African Development Bank (AfDB) for TAAT project. The European Commission (EC) gave support to the AIRTEA project through OACPS, CAADP XP4 through IFAD and LEAP4FNSSA. Other contributors to FARA's activities during the year include FAO, which gave funding to Forgotten Foods and African Heritage of Food Commodity ; AGRIDEA supported YPARD; and Development of Soil Initiative for Africa was supported with funding from Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF), USAID (through IFDC) and Catholic Relief Services. Africa Food Systems was supported by AGRA and NORAD (through AUDA/NEPAD), while AFREXIMBANK supported CAAPs.

FARA is sincerely grateful to, and acknowledges the contributions made by all its development partners mentioned in this report.

The Secretariat has made several significant achievements towards its 2022 indicator targets, with an overall performance of 89%. This was an improvement to the performance of 2021, which was rated at 76%. At 70% the budget utilisation over the first half of the year remained low despite concerted actions to break this pattern. The utilisation figure would have been higher if the budget process had been more accurate in the assumptions made regarding timing for reporting of sub-granted funds.

The Secretariat has registered several significant achievements towards more sustainable financing of its programmes. These are underpinned by strong partnership within the context of the CAADP XP4 consortium, a compelling value proposition and a refreshed science agenda for CAADP. Strengthening the partnership and working modalities with the One CGIAR stands out as an important ongoing activity.

The Secretariat acknowledges the value of the Board's guidance to focus on engagements in the policy space, including at high level. By participating in COP27 to launch consultations for the African CSA action plan, plus engaging in AUC processes regarding preparations for the 2023 African Fertilizer and Soil Health Summit and through PANAP and LEAP4FNSSA, engaging with the AU-EU high level platforms for dialogue, the Secretariat served its role of projecting the voice of African stakeholders. The value of this work was most appreciated by stakeholders in the lead up to and during the Abidjan I and II dialogues between African stakeholders and the One CGIAR. These activities are turning out to be the kind through which FARA offers the greatest value.

The one year no-cost extension recommended by the mid-term review of the CAADP XP4 project is welcomed, as it offers the CAADP XP4 consortium valuable extra time to consolidate the project's outputs into outcomes and work towards securing resources that will sustain the momentum towards the transformation of the CAADP XP4 partnership into a sustainable, functional and impactful consortium.

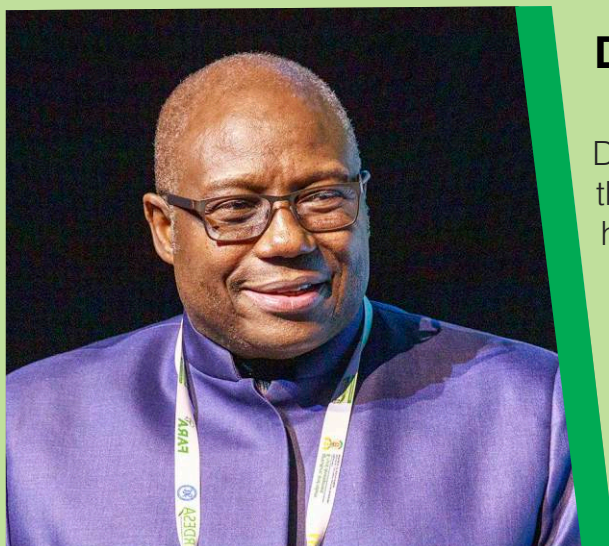

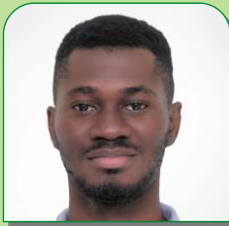
